Five Upstate Colleges Partner on Workforce Initiative

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<u>TechReadySC</u>, a collaboration of five Upstate South Carolina technical and community colleges and the South Carolina Technical College System office, has launched a workforce development initiative developed by the National Association of Manufacturers in 2005.

The program is called <u>Dream It Do It</u> and aspires to attract more young people to careers in manufacturing. York Technical College unveiled the program on October 12th. Jennifer McNelly, senior vice president of the <u>Manufacturing Institute</u> was the keynote speaker and discussed the success of DIDI in other regions of the county. Local business leaders also discussed the importance of the DIDI program.

Greenville Technical College, Piedmont Technical College, Spartanburg Community College, Tri-County Technical College, York Technical College and the South Carolina Manufacturers Alliance are part of the program, developed with a grant from AdvanceSC. "It is more important than ever for South Carolina to position itself as competitive in the global marketplace," said Lewis Gossett, president and CEO of the S.C. Manufacturers Alliance. "Having a qualified and skilled workforce is the backbone for economic prosperity, and it is our mission through Dream It Do It to communicate to young people the rewarding and broad range of career opportunities available to them in manufacturing."

TechReadySC's core mission is to build a more competitive workforce in the Upstate by providing innovative services to meet the economy's existing and emerging human performance needs. The first major charge for the collaboration was to develop a standardized curriculum among the five Upstate partner colleges leading to specialty certificates and associate degrees in the area of mechatronics technology.

Mechatronics is an interdisciplinary field that includes mechanical, instrumentation, electronics, robotics, automation, computer components and control systems. The program is designed to educate technicians to troubleshoot equipment problems for a manufacturing sector that is becoming increasingly high tech and requires workers to have a broad understanding of equipment.

Economists at USC's <u>Darla Moore School of Business</u> predict modest growth for the state in the new year, but they don't expect it to be evenly spread statewide. USC researchers estimate that the state's employment will grow by 1.2% in 2011, the strongest forecast in four years, according to economist Doug Woodward. Job growth in 2010 limped along at a rate of 0.1%. He and the USC team predict the growth will be particularly strong in the Upstate and Lowcountry. The Upstate will get a boost as the automotive cluster grows, Woodward said. Car sales have nowhere to go but up, and that will help the sector, he said. One area of the state that should thrive: Rock Hill. It will continue to tap into the economic prosperity of the Charlotte metro area, Woodward said. Despite the forecast of modest growth, the state still will have lower employment levels than it did before the recession. If the state maintained 1.2% job growth, it would not return to pre-recession employment levels until sometime in 2014, according to USC economist Joseph Von Nessen.

Catawba Region's OneStops Serve Record Numbers

The Catawba Regional Workforce Investment Area, one of 12 workforce investment areas in the state, has assisted record numbers of dislocated and adult job seekers during the national economic downturn. The Catawba Regional Workforce Investment Area includes Chester, Lancaster, and York counties. Job seekers and employers have access to a wide variety of services through the Catawba One-Stop Workforce System. One-Stop Centers are located in each county.

During Program Year 2009 which began July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010, the One-Stop centers received 223,405 customer visits, with an average of more than 32,000 customers seeking services each month. A total of 13,529 attended over 1,600 group workshops on resume writing, interviewing skills, job search techniques, networking, etc. Other numbers for the program year included 1,684 individuals enrolled in the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Adult program and 1,389 in the dislocated worker program. A total of 245 participated in the WIA Summer Youth program while 242 are currently enrolled in the year-round youth program.
